#### **Trek Bicycle Founder Dies at 73**

As reported by The Associated Press, Richard "Dick" Burke, founder of the Trek Bicycle Corp died on March 10 from complications related to heart surgery. Burke started the well known bicycle company in a red barn in Waterloo, Wisconsin in 1976, after being unable to find any higher-end bike he could distribute in the United States. Trek, of course, became famous for the carbon fiber bikes ridden by Lance Armstrong in his string of seven Tour de France wins.

John Burke, the company's president, said of his father "He always wanted to build the best bicycle company in the world and he did it. Every time he saw a Trek (on the road), he smiled." The company is also known for several other major brands in has developed or acquired, including Gary Fisher, Klein and LeMond. Trek sells about 1.5 million bicycles per year, totaling about \$700 million in sales. Among Richard Burke's more memorable life experiences were completing five NYC marathons, three Boston marathons and being in France for Lance Armstrong's first Tour de France victory.

#### Did you know?

- The 1979 movie "Breaking Away" features the Little 500 bicycle race, which has been held annually on the campus of Indiana University since 1951. The race began as a fund-raiser for scholarship money for working students, and was the brain-child of Howard S. "Howdy" Wilcox, whose father won the Indianapolis 500 auto race in 1919...The August 4, 2003 issue of Sports Illustrated named "Breaking Away" #8 on a list of Top 50 sports movies of all time.
- The world record for slow cycling is held by Tsugunobu Mitsuishi of Tokyo, Japan, who was stationary on a bicycle for five hours and twenty-five minutes.
- The only American cyclist to have won a stage in all three Grand Tours (Italy, Spain and France) is... David Zabriske.
- The largest multi-rider bicycle ever manufactured was nearly 67 feet long and accommodated 35 riders.
- Cannondale Bicycles had its start in 1971 in a cramped loft above a pickle factory, where the bicycle industry's first bicycle trailer was conceived and manufactured. Cannondale introduced their first touring bicycle in 1983, and their first racing bicycle in 1984. Today, they sell over 80 models in 70 countries worldwide.
- At St. Helen's School in Newbury, Ohio, unicycling is a mandatory subject, and students are allowed to ride in the halls between classes.
- The first American woman to win a world cycling title was Sheila Young of Detroit, Michigan. She won the women's World Road Racing championship in 1973, just six months after winning the world 500 meter speed skating championship. Her brother, Roger, was a member of the US cycling team in the 1972 Olympics.

- Arm Warmers (\$25 / \$30)

Bring your check book (or cash) and the completed form, or mail to the PMBC P.O. Box ASAP. If you would like the items shipped to you, add a measly \$5 and you won't even have to worry about picking it up.

#### League of American Bicyclists - Update Excerpts

- Record Number of BFC Applications -Bicycle Friendly Community program reviewers have the pleasant task
  of reviewing a record number of applications for recognition in the latest round of awards. Almost 40
  communities have applied 26 for the first time, 13 to get their earlier designation renewed or upgraded. "The
  only time we had more new applicants," according to program director Bill Nesper, "was the very first round of
  applications for the revamped program in 2003 when we asked the more than 50 communities designated
  under the old program to re-apply." The results will be announced before the kick-off of National Bike Month in
  May.
- Chicago Passes Ordinance to Protect Cyclists Chicago cyclists are cheering passage of a significant local
  ordinance promising much greater protection from motorists. The legislation endorsed by the Mayor and city
  Department of Transportation was passed on March 12 and prohibits opening a door into moving traffic;
  sets a three-foot minimum passing distance; increases fines for parking in a bike lane or marked shared lane;
  and prohibits motorists from turning right in front of a bicyclist. The ordinance sets a minimum fine of \$500
  when these actions lead to a bicycle crash. The provision was a major goal of the 2015 Bike Plan, and was
  backed enthusiastically by the Chicagoland Bicycle Federation.
- Clarke to Keynote AZ Conference and El Tour de Phoenix League President Andy Clarke is the featured speaker at the second annual Arizona Statewide Bicycle Conference, Friday, April 4 in Mesa, Ariz. Clarke is joined on the program by LAB super-volunteer Richard Moeur – our representative to the National Committee on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (NCUTCD).
